Stone Age - A prehistoric period when weapons and tools were made of stone or organic materials



Skara Brae

Skara Brae is a stone-

built Neolithic settlement, located on the Bay of Skaill on the west coast of Mainland, the largest island in the Orkney Islands of Scotland. The site was occupied from roughly 3180 BC to about 2500 BC and is Europe's most complete Neolithic village.

Stonehenge

Stonehenge is one of the world's most famous monuments. It stands on Salisbury Plain, in Wiltshire, and its giant stones can be seen from miles around. Stonehenge took many hundreds of years to build. Work began in the late Neolithic Age, around 3000BC. Over the next thousand years, people changed parts of the monument. The last changes were made in the early Bronze Age, around 1500BC.

<u>Palaeolithic Period</u>

Britain was part of mainland Europe. First humans probably arrive in Britain 900,000 years ago. Period is marked by two ice ages.

Mesolithic Period

Set up camps along the British coast. Hunters work together and move around with the seasons.

Neolithic Period

Britain becomes an island. People learn to farm and begin to settle down and live in small communities.

Bronze Age

Learn to use bronze. People live in small communities led by a chief. People gather together for religious ceremonies.

Learn to make iron.
Farming flourished and

protect against other
invaders.
